
Every season, a few books among the tide of publications are destined to become landmarks. It certainly is the case with *Peau-de-Sang*, Audrée Wilhelmy's powerful sixth novel exploring further women's rituals inherited from a primeval inception. Readers will also delight in Yin Chen's allegorical reinterpretation of the *Ahimsa* peace principle.

Two strong YA voices emerge from the autumnal mist: Jean-François Sénéchal with his *Chris* trilogy – gathering in a single volume his award-winning previous works *Le boulevard*, *Au carrefour* and *Les avenues* –, and Marc-André Dufour-Labbé, whose *Carreauté Kid*, his first foray in YA fiction, borrows from the grunge ethos with an affectionate turn.

Drama is also an essential component of this fall season: *Racine carrée du verbe être*, Wajdi Mouawad's seven-hour stage marathon displays the playwright's very own magnificent and tragic literary architecture.

More than thirty new books will be published by Leméac along the next few months. Only a few of them are presented here. You can access the entire catalog by browsing our website or by following us on social media. It is never too late nor too soon to get hold of works originating from our geographical, private and imaginary territories, and to allow writing to remain an art of sharing and a living culture.

LES GIRAFES EN FEU

[BURNING GIRAFFES]

After three unsuccessful business ventures, the renovation of their eight-room home, rockabilly, carpentry and Greek classes, and two break-ups in the same year, Daniel Fortin and Nancy Vallée are still willing to work things out and grow old together.

The opportunity to put their inventive spirit to work and inject some passion into their relationship arise when the owner of the seedy Le Chic motel suggests they revamp the image of his establishment.

With the help of their son, they form a partnership with the local zoo, which attracts renewed interest from the international artistic community since Olaf, a movie star gorilla, has moved there.

Celbrity tourists are invited to take part in exclusive banquets featuring experiences as captivating as they are disturbing – Dancing Desert, Inner Forest, Astral Herbal Tea, Cortical Salon... – offering visitors privileged access to the animals and a semblance of spirituality.

For a time, the Fortin-Vallée ambitions seem to become a reality, yet they remain unsatisfied. Daniel, obsessed with his work, suffers a series of heart attacks - which he inflicts on himself with repeated electric shocks - near-death experiences and resuscitations. Meanwhile, the revolutionary mascot group Burning Giraffes and graffiti artist Zen Lester protest against the noisy tourism that takes their city hostage...


Through irresistible humour, incredible situations and a the depiction of a highly unusual microcosm, Gabriel Allaire takes a sensitive and accurate look at long-lasting love, at work that often complicates relationships between people, and at the pitfalls of the American dream.

Born in Saint-Hyacinthe in 1990, Gabriel Allaire's first novel (Pas de géants) was published by Leméac and won the 2018 Robert-Walser Prize.

AHIMSA

On the banks of an eternal river, three ghosts from another time meet. Now embodied as a rat, a fly, and a snake, all unloved animals, they feel they are better off than when they lived in human form. But, as they're still haunted by their former life, they set about telling their side of the story, expressing their shame, remorse and bitter feelings. Above all, they recount their memories of a ubiquitous common master, towards whom they now feel complex emotions and whose teaching they question. With their past actions not fully accomplished, they return, hoping to bring their destiny full circle with an ultimate act. Yet, what they've been through in the past was so tragic that, in their opinion, three hundred years would not suffice to rehabilitate them.

The political, moral and environmental issues raised by this novel are vaguely reminiscent of the partition of India and its spiritual leader, Mahatma Gandhi, but the free narrative style makes it seem more like a timeless drama repeated over and over again.

A master in the art of creating a dialogue between the living and the dead, Ying Chen shows once again that the borders between the two realms are rather bridges between two dimensions of the same terrible reality.

Born in 1961, a graduate of Fudan University (Shanghai) and McGill University, Ying Chen has published a dozen novels – including L'ingratitude, which was a finalist for the Prix Femina and won the Prix Québec-Paris and the Grand Prix des lectrices of Elle Québec – as well as two essays, including La lenteur des montagnes (2014). Her previous novel, Rayonnements (2020), evoked the destiny of Pierre and Marie Curie's family.



ORANGE, L'UNIQUE LUMIÈRE

[ORANGE, THE ONLY LIGHT]

Recently settled in Vienna, the narrator discovers Egon Schiele's Portrait of Wally Neuzil, painted in 1912, during a visit to the museum. He is instanty captivated by the model, a young woman with fiery red hair and piercing blue eyes.

Who was this modest Austrian woman, who became Egon Schiele's muse and lover in early twentieth-century Vienna? How did the painting, after being stolen by the Nazis from its owner, art dealer Lea Bondi, find itself almost a hundred years later at the heart of a litigation that dragged on for over a decade in the United States?

Over the course of weeks, then months, the narrator recounts Wally's singular journey along with that of her famous portrait, telling in a very personal way the intersecting stories concealed in the clear gaze of the woman in the painting.


Sara Lazzaroni's vivid, precise and sober style goes beyond the appearances, beyond what hides behind solitude when cameras are off and lights have gone out.

Healing the living with her magic hands, she absorbs the prohibitions they dare not transgress. While the mayor, the doctor, the notary, the tinsmith, the letter carrier and above all Sulfureur pay her in cash or furs for their pleasure, women discover the way to be in tune with their sex.

Rituals are observed, traditions passed on, and pleasure is always exhilarating. Audrée Wilhelmy's new novel celebrates generations of charmeresses disguised in the fine lace of irrepressible, age-old urges. Peau-de-Sang knows the world and all its secrets, and pulls at the thread of lives as she unravels the language of bodies.

There are several tales in this novel and as many novels in this tale. Where does intuition end, and where does dream begin?

Peau-de-Sang is an ode to the irrepressible vehemence of femininity.

Audrée Wilhelmy was born in Cap-Rouge in 1985. Her work, also published in France, won her the Prix Sade 2015 and the Prix Ouest-France Étonnants Voyageurs 2022, and she was a finalist for numerous awards: Prix littéraire des collégiens, Grand Prix du livre de Montréal, Prix des libraires du Québec, Governor General's Literary Awards, Prix France-Québec. Simultaneously with the publication of Peau-de-Sang, a paperback reprint of the author's previous title, Blanc Résine, will also be released.

LE VOYAGE À L'ENVERS

[A JOURNEY IN REVERSE]

Sixteen-year-old Laura divides her time between school, her boyfriend Adrien and her part-time job. Underneath this quiet day to day life, stiffled anger is brewing: after five years, the teenager is still angry at her father who could have easily avoided an accident, had he not been so careless to play tennis on a suffocatingly hot day and dying of a heart attack on the court.

When her mother suggests that they should go together on the trip her husband and her were about to make, Laura is reluctant. Although she was born in Vietnam, she has no interest in that country and doesn't understand why her family and friends are urging her to go there to "reconnect with her origins". Yet, in order not to disappoint her mother, she agrees to accompany her. While her mother revisits places full of memories, the young woman struggles to overcome the culture shock, and is torn by conflicting emotions. After a visit to the orphanage where she was sent as a baby, the tensions within her rise, and the barrier she had built for herself finally breaks down.

In this touching and very personal novel, Linda Amyot tackles the difficult question of origins. What determines where one comes from? How and why can we build a link with the country we were born in, without ever having lived there, and where everything is foreign to us?

A screenwriter, editor and novelist Linda Amyot won the Prix jeunesse des libraires du Québec and the TD Children's and Youth Literature Award with La fille d'en face. Her second young adult novel, Le jardin d'Amsterdam, won the Governor General's Literary Award and the Prix du livre jeunesse des Bibliothèques de Montréal. She is the director of youth programming for the Blue Metropolis Festival.

Fifteen-year-old Jacob's world shatters when he has to follow his mother who is moving to the country with her new partner. His friends, his girlfriend, his life are in Montreal, and for him, everything falls apart. Even though he is happy for his mother and considers Julien a decent guy, he has no interest living at the back of beyond.

Rebellious, Jacob refuses to settle down for good and spends his time ranting and brooding in the den he's set up near a creek in the village, all the more distraught as, surprisingly, his friends and his girlfriend Tamara only answer his messages once in a while... While the local teens try to get acquainted with him, he devises a plan: to sneak back to Montreal before the two-week deadline imposed by his mother. But his enthusiasm is quickly dampened when, once back in town, he learns why Tamara and her friends have become so distant.


The bitter betrayal felt by Jacob is however progressively soothed by the presence of Henri, a mountain-bike enthusiast, by the high spirits of Emma, an ace at skimming stones, by the generosity of Florette, Emma's grandmother, and by the kindness of amateur mechanics Fred, Étienne and Émile. New bonds are formed, prejudices fall, and Jacob eventually discovers that what seemed like hell to him may not be so bad after all.

Christine Bertrand's Les ricochets is a feelgood novel that eschews all the clichés about country life. The author of La balade de Jo et Alicia (Leméac, 2020) focuses instead on the disarray felt by teenagers uprooted from their world following a move, and she portrays young people living in the country in a rarely seen way in YA fiction.

Carreauté Kid, a.k.a. Caro, doesn't fit in with his fellow students at his high school: raised by a single-parent father with a mild drinking problem, he's a fan of grunge music, whose spirit he embodies even in his clothing style. A loner and introvert, he's secretly in love with Adele, a beautiful, radiant and levelheaded redhead - except that Adele, despite the obvious chemistry between them, is in a relationship with Aymeric, the popular captain of the school hockey team. Caro shyly opens through the song covers he dedicates to her on his YouTube channel, until the day he decides to confess his feelings in a letter. The situation becomes more complicated when Aymeric gets hold of the letter and makes fun of it on TikTok with his teammates...


In a novel that plays with both nostalgia and issues of our time, Marc-André Dufour-Labbé portrays a young man caught up in the turmoil of a seemingly impossible love, through which he learns about the complexity of feelings and discovers that the solution may lie outside monogamy...

CHRIS

When he wakes up on the morning of his eighteenth birthday, Chris is alone in the modest apartment where he lives with his mother. When night falls and she doesn't come home, the young man realizes that she has simply abandoned him. Thus begins Le boulevard, introducing Chris, an individual with intellectual disability. Overnight, he has to learn to live independently in a difficult environment where, thanks to his endearing candor, he manages to find solidarity and support that help him face the challenges of everyday life, as well as the more extraordinary tribulations.

Gathering in a single volume *Le boulevard*, *Au carrefour*, and *Les avenues*, Sénéchal's three books about what it is to be different and yet living a full life, *Chris* offers readers a philosophical look on life, on the strength and fragility of feelings, on love and parental responsibilities, and on loyalty, friendship, freedom and courage. Rarely has such a perspective been approached so subtly and convincingly in Quebec literature, far removed from caricature and cliché.

Trained in anthropology, Jean-François Sénéchal now dedicates his time to writing. In 2018, his YA novel Le boulevard appeared on the List of Honour of the International Board on Books for Young People (IBBY). His next book, Au carrefour, won the 2019 Prix jeunesse des libraires du Québec in the 12 to 17 year-old category. In 2017, he received the Joseph S. Stauffer Award from the Canada Council for the Arts, a prize aimed at encouraging outstanding promising young Canadians.

LE FAISEUR

(A HONORÉ DE BALZAC PLAY REVISITED)

[DEBT IS WHERE THE HEART IS]

Mercadet, ruined, has invented a wealthy partner to placate his creditors, and plans to marry off his daughter to a young man he believes to be wealthy, but who is even deeper in debt than he is. Such is the starting point of Balzac's comedy of manners that unfolds a series of misunderstandings and comical situations, ridiculing usurers and other debtors.

This fast-paced adaptation transports the plot to present-day Quebec, to a world of investors who create needs people never knew they had. Here, Balzac's neglected characters (wives, servants) stand out, and the interweaving of their pushy motivations constitutes a dazzling ballet of fabulations. In the eye of the storm, of course, is capitalism, the kind that makes us speculate on appearances. A precise portrait of a genius crook, a social study in which the dominant and the less fortunate stake their lives, the play is a hilarious and speedy settling of the very bedrock of our civilization.

Balzac's play *Mercadet ou Le faiseur* was written in 1840. Gabrielle Chapdelaine's renewed version premiered at Théâtre Denise-Pelletier in January 2023, directed by Alice Ronfard.

Playwright, screenwriter, translator, a 2017 graduate of the Playwriting program at the National Theatre School of Canada, Gabrielle Chapdelaine has participated in several theatrical projects in Quebec, Martinique, France and Germany. Her play Une journée, published by Leméac, won the Prix Gratien-Gélinas in 2018, and is now being translated into English and German; it premiered in the U.S. in 2020, then in Carleton-sur-Mer and at Théâtre de Quat'Sous in 2022.

In *Seuls*, the son of a Lebanese family is faced with the news that his father is in a coma, and the symbolic significance of Rembrandt's painting *The Return of the Prodigal Son*.

In *Sœurs*, the second part of Wajdi Mouawad's "Domestique" cycle, a woman expresses the suffering caused by her family's exile and the difficulty of making a dual culture coexist within her.

In *Mère*, the third part of the cycle, a Lebanese mother escapes the civil war that tears her country apart, and settles in Paris with her three children. Due to his professional commitments, her husband doesn't know if he'll be able to join them. Thus begins an absurd parenthesis for the family, consumed by the fear of the irreparable damage of war, and the desperate wait a father whose absence prevents them from resuming a normal life.

The reader lives with her through five years of torment, impatience and bitterness, with the double impossibility of settling down and returning to the homeland, but also with furious bursts of voice, imagination, humour and wonderful moments, as the children put down roots, as best they can and against their mother's wishes, who would like to remain in that state of expectation.

This volume reprise the text of the play initially published in an illustrated version in the fall of 2022.

«Why is living not sufficient for us to attain happiness?»

From that starting point, Wajdi Mouawad's sumptuous, tragic, geopoetic and hard-hitting theatrical mathematics takes us on a whirling ride of possible lives for Talyani Waqar Malik: an Italian neurosurgeon, a Parisian cab driver, a Quebec painter, a Texan death row inmate, a Lebanese shopkeeper. Five destinies in as many different places, all closely interwoven in a single hallucinatory space-time. Each of these incarnations sees their fate disrupted and accelerated in the week following the explosion in the port of Beirut on August 4, 2020, forty-two years after four of them fled the civil war in 1978.

This uchronia brings to the stage the now unforgettable characters of the Domestic Cycle - father, mother, brother, sister, and the imagined descendants of Talyani, Wajdi Mouawad's alter ego - as well as the major themes of the playwright's literary universe, namely war and exile, rape and incest, filiation and unexpected identities, crime and the right to forgiveness. Current issues are also tackled here, such as ecology, cancel culture, physician-assisted dying, and the inexhaustible question of love.

Between point A and point B, youth and old age, science and conscience, between those we love and those we might have loved, the revelations of quantum mechanics shatter the causal link: If I'm here, it's because I'm there... What nearly happened influences what happens, the uncertain influences the certain...

Actor, stage director and director of La Colline national theatre in Paris, Wajdi Mouawad is the author of the epic quartet Le Sang des promesses (Littoral, Incendies, Forêts, Ciels) and the novel Anima (2012). 

Withdrawn in the hinterland, François undertakes to trap his solitude in the tales he invents to patch up his shattered life. A shrewd storyteller, he hopes to put behind him the trials he went through - first and foremost, his daughter leaving - and to get closer to Mado, the landlady whose freckled skin and immense heart could fend off the remaining fears that lurk around him. Beau Diable, a seven-headed beast, will see to it in a terrifying way...

This magnificent story told by a man at the end of his tether, is both a exhilarating work on language and a brilliant piece of writing that fluctuates between truth and delight. 

Standing in front of the kitchen window, I peered outside at the old abandoned rusty machinery in the yard. [...] The carcasses stood motionless, hemmed in by dry grass and bleached by autumn, like sun-dried insect moults. Looking at them in the midday light, I thought that maybe I, too, was an endangered species.

At the end of an abandoned logging road, somewhere between the Mistassini and Ouasiemsca rivers – as close to nowhere as you can get – Rozie lives alone with his dogs. The place suits him very well, and so does the solitude. Yet he's far less enthralled by his work that consists in manufacturing amphetamines in his clandestine laboratory for a gang of drug dealers. He would like to move on. But his past catches up with him, and he's about to lose everything.

After his debut short story collection *Debout sur la carlingue*, Julien Gravelle tackles enthusiastically the detective story with the same colourful language, set in the same magnificent and sometimes overwhelming nature, but this time driven by a breathless plot and a wry sense of humour.

Les cowboys sont fatigués is Julien Gravelle's second book to be published by Leméac, after Debout sur la carlingue. He is also the author of Musher and Nitassinan, published in France by Éditions Wildproject.



LE VIEUX MONDE DERRIÈRE NOUS

[THE OLD WORLD LEFT BEHIND]

As the first stirrings of May 68 begin in Paris, Gil Kemeid arrives from Montreal. A recent scholarship student destined to study architecture, but above all the lover of a young woman whom he unexpectedly leaves, the Egyptian-Quebecer is driven by his dream of travelling through Europe on a symbolic odyssey that would allow him to reconnectwithhis Levantine origins. Delayed by the whirlwind of demonstrations that shake the city, he finally arrives in Marseille, where he purchases a used Vespa on which he sets on travelling the roads of France, then Spain, Italy, Yugoslavia, Kosovo, Turkey, Bulgaria, Hungary, Austria, Czechoslovakia, and Bavaria. Along the many punctures and encounters, under good skies and bad rain, he pushes his Rosinante to the limit, while living his dream, without quite realizing it, because the return to Montreal looms ahead, though he promises himself to come back.

Throughout his journey, he writes postcards to his distant lover and confidante, who keeps them all. And it's those cards that decades later allow their son Olivier Kemeid, to re-embark unwillingly on the same crazy journey, riding the 1965 green scooter, stuck to the back of his yet-to-be father. This ride, initially so personal, takes the author's pen to new heights and takes him behind the scenes of History, which his father only glimpsed during his unbridled ride.

A reading delight, this books combines two aspects of a same story: the original initiatory journey, and the filial journey, where the family mythologies - from grandfather to father to son - merge, and transcend.



ANIMA

Anima opens with a sordid murder: Wahhch Debch returns home and discovers his murdered wife, a knife stuck in the sex and the child she was carrying. A real manhunt begins, a furious inner odyssey that will take him from Montreal across North America to the south, leading him into a real hell: how far can a man go down the well of his pain, and what encounters can he face on his own without losing his mind?

The murderer's name is Nelson Wolf Rooney. He is an American Mohawk hiding in the Kanawake reserve, a dangerous criminal involved in all kinds of schemes. As the Sûreté du Québec's investigation progresses, the fragments of a memory long buried in the depths of his childhood are awakened in Wahhch, as far as the Sabra and Chatila camps, places of darkness and atrocities, even underground, at the heart of human curses.

Wajdi Mouawad has the sure instinct of the writer who dives into his own abysses. Through its sheer literary scope, Anima pushes the boundaries of literature, because this Minotaur of a novel is a beast, both real and fabulous, that wants to devour the Unforgettable.

Born in Lebanon in 1968, Wajdi Mouawad has first lived in Paris, then Montreal, and is now back in Paris where since 2016 he manages the Théâtre national de la Colline. He is notably the author of Le Sang des promesses, an epic theatre quartet whose second part, Incendies, has been brought to the screen by Denis Villeneuve. His second novel after Visage retrouvé (Leméac / Actes Sud, 2002), Anima, has won the prix Phénix de littérature, the Grand Prix Thyde-Monnier of the Société des gens de lettres, the prix de la Méditerranée, the Prize for the second novel of Lecture en tête, the Jury Prize of the Algue d'or and the Catalan Llibreter Prize for foreign novels.





LA SHÉHÉRAZADE DES PAUVRES

[The Poorman's Scheherazade]

After his moment of glory in the play of the same name, Hosanna, a favourite character of Michel Tremblay, remained in the shadow of a distressing humiliation. Ridiculed at school, puny, nicknamed "Banana Split", he earned his living as a ladies' hairdresser on the Plaza St-Hubert, where he still plies his trade, fifty years later, in times of pandemic. Since the Duchess was killed forty-five years ago, Hosanna has been holed up in his squalid apartment, reminiscing over his queen rags and indulging in liberal daily gin intake.

This open-ended novel brings the seventy-nine year old former transvestite back to the stage, as he is visited by a young journalist from *Fugues* magazine.

Yannick, about to conduct his first ever interview, is in fact interested in the 70s set, and encounters Hosanna to get to know "the era" better. But the one-hour interview he thought he was having with Claude Lemieux turns into a week-long exchange, during which his interest in Hosanna develops much more than his curiosity about the period the latter represents. A colourful, loud-mouthed chronic alcoholic, Hosanna introduces him to the milieu, to what was happening behind the scenes, to the internal wars, to the homophobic violence of the time, and reveals to the young man secrets known only to him: the life of misery of the "queens", the "trannies", and the lovers – his very own in particular, Cuirette, nearing the end of his life. Through a clever subterfuge, some of the stories told by Hosanna to the journalist, and also some of the confidences made by the journalist to Hosanna, are put into prose besides the disheveled dialogue both have.

As 2023 will mark the 50th anniversary of the play, the novelist brings out Hosanna in all her raw splendour – the "Scheherazade of the poor", overwhelmed by loneliness and pathetic self-mockery.



BLANC RÉSINE

[White Resin]

I'm fourteen years old. I like girls who eat the skin like good fruits and curl up in the clay when seized by rapture, printing their serpentine shape into the soft soil. I like boys undulating with flowing pleasure, hesitating on which curves to hold on to from the breasts or buttocks or thighs or cheeks, as their hands are so small and their hunger so great.

In a convent built by women's hands on the edge of the boreal forest, twenty-four sisters give birth to a little girl who will grow up learning the language and laws of Ina Maka, Mother Earth. A little further away, a worker at the Kohle Co. mine dies in childbirth, leaving an albino baby to her father, who'll work himself to death so the young one can one day become a doctor.

The novel recounts the encounter, mating and destiny of these two dissimilar beings, Daã and Laure, and that of their offspring. It carries the smells of the taiga and the sounds of the city; stories of women fleeing, debacle and children left behind. It goes back to the origins of a lineage from which Noé of Oss and The Body of the Beasts will come out.

Audrée Wilhelmy was born in Cap-Rouge in 1985. She devotes her time to writing and teaches creative writing. Blanc Résine is her fourth novel. Her most recent story, Plie la rivière (September 2021), takes us back to the raw world of Oss, her first book (2012) – where the uniqueness of her literary universe was revealed.


Féléor Barthélémy Rü hasn't only inherited a large fortune from his Master Huntsman uncle; he was also bequeathed with the urge to kill and a taste for raw flesh, indulging in those pleasures with women he encounters, some of whom become his wives and his victims.

Mercredi, Constance, Abigaëlle, Frida, Phélie, Lottä, and Marie: seven women, seven experiences in desire, violence, and death; seven voices that reveal unspeakable fantasies and tell of femininity, self-hatred, narcissism, and submission. Although the premise of *Les sangs* (*Bloods*) may be reminiscent of a famous folk tale, there's no secret room here, whose entry the beloved wives of a new kind of Blue Beard would be denied on pain of death. 


Objects of envy and suspicious bargaining, hundreds of paintings by Matisse, Picasso, Vermeer, Rembrandt, and Da Vinci were only just saved before the nazis arrived in Paris, while others were sent to the Führer and his henchmen. Among them was the famous Hermann Göring, Marshal of the German Empire, who selected thousands of works for his personal collection while the art nouveau material, seen as degenerate art, was burned right before the eyes of devastated curators. At the end of the war, thanks to Jacques Jaujard, director of the Louvre and the National Museums, these stolen pieces found their way back to their original museums, and more than sixty thousand art treasures, mainly looted from Jewish collectors, were returned to their rightful owners.




